# **Principal's Report**

### **School Council Elections**

Congratulations to both candidates in our School Council election. 111 votes were returned and the final result was very tight. Natalie Duffy has been elected for a two-year term. Michael Smith as a candidate will automatically be considered for co-option to council.

### **Children in Cars and Road Safety**

We have had a lot of publicity this summer about leaving children in cars and had a report from a parent that this had happened on our street border. Although the weather is cooler **the inside of a car is no place for children** without an adult present. Please take the extra time to walk your children into the grounds.

Another concern expressed by parents has been children exiting the car on the traffic side. Road rules exist to ensure that this side of the car needs to be exited with a high level of care. Please also direct your child to stay on the footpath if you have other children or items to remove.

### **Building Update**

As you can see our building is really taking shape. It will be a unique learning space - able to support our culture and the development of exciting possibilities! We are still on target for a 20 June handover, giving us a week before the holidays to move furniture.

We have started 2014 with 185 students and so will be entitled to a Mod5 double classroom as well as our core classroom building. These buildings are well configured learning spaces – a far cry from the old "portables" concept. The fact about Departmental Building Projects is that a "Core" building is built, in our case to house a notional 175 children, and then Mod5's appear related to yearly enrolments. The good news is that we will never become the forest of portables seen in areas of rapid growth thus ensuring that the spacious grounds our children now enjoy will remain a feature of the school. Growth within the school is an aspect that will ensure better access to funding and resources but it is important to grow in a quality manner. It is so easy to look at big schools from afar and assume that everyone is being carried along in that stream and everything must be ok. Having come from big schools I really value the personalised leading, individual care and connection we have in this wonderful environment. The lessons we have learned about a small school need to inform our growth and development – we are so appreciative of you all for selecting our school and supporting our focus as we look forward to an even brighter future.

### **Annual General Meeting**

The Annual General Meeting of Council is planned for Tuesday the 18 of March at 6:30 pm in the Grade 1/2 Rooms. This meeting is typically about the Annual report which contains the Government School Performance Summary for 2013. With the late release of the template and a new requirement to demonstrate Victorian Quality and Registration Authority compliance I would only anticipate a draft report being produced for the coming week. In its final form the Annual Report will be available to all families and will be the subject of a future open Council Meeting.
