Setting Up For 2015

At Montmorency Primary School, we aim to maximize all of the available resources (human, financial and physical) to deliver a high quality education for all students. We ensure the educational program we offer our students and school community remains open to development, is sound in its approach and practice, and prepares people for future challenges and opportunities in life.

In preparation for 2015, we are in the process of considering class lists and looking at staffing and the physical placement of classes. We are currently in the process of hiring a teacher to implement Japanese at Foundation Level. We will advertise positions for Physical Education with a small music component to assist me as I return to Music teaching in 2015. Art, Music, Gardening and Kitchen (Grades 3-6) will continue to be on offer.

We have rolled back our colours program into two groups in 2015, and so will have more children in our core whilst retaining similar overall numbers to 2014. Grade groupings are exciting. We anticipate two Foundation "Colour" groupings, two Foundation groups, two Grade 1/2 groupings, two Grade 3/4 groups and a Grade 5/6. Grade composition is usually a simple process. If parents have any information they wish us to consider please let us know within the next two weeks. We are looking to develop our staff and create powerful teams so there will be some changes. Of course, in the new building children will not feel isolated from friends or trusted adults. Our new building and portable give us the option to implement cooperative models of working together and the Grade structure will further enhance team planning and shared understandings.

As you can see it is all about the steps, stages and innovative thinking needed to create a future-focused, self-sustaining school built on the wonderful culture that presently underpins our unique environment.

OSHC Update

Thank you all for your feedback on the School Council's proposal to outsource our OSHC programme. We received 11 responses - which represents about 1 in 10 families in the school. The general feedback was mixed, however on the 'scored' element of the feedback by far and away the most important factor identified was 'my child's enjoyment of the service' (which is not really related to a school run or outsourced programme). On the basis that the feedback was not overwhelming in any direction and that there are a number of benefits to the school, it is planned to go ahead and use Camp Australia to provide our service from term 1 2015. Camp Australia will be providing written communication to all families in the next two weeks and we are working on settling up a face-to-face information session before the end of this term. I would like to take this opportunity again to thank our current OSHC team for all of their hard work in running our current programme. Montmorency Primary School has started its journey to becoming more sustainable by getting involved in the ResourceSmart AuSSI Vic (Australian Sustainable Schools Initiative) program. ResourceSmart AuSSI Vic is currently an initiative of the Victorian Government and is managed by Sustainability Victoria.

ResourceSmart AuSSI Vic provides a holistic approach to sustainability. It integrates educational, environmental, social and economic outcomes so that schools do not see each area in isolation but as components of the bigger picture of sustainability. Schools are supported to develop a 'whole school approach' to building sustainability into the fabric of everyday school and community life.

Primary school attendance

Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education.
Students learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind.

Why it's important

We all want our students to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school each and every day.

If students miss school regularly, they miss out on learning the fundamental skills that will set them up for success in the later years of school.

There is no safe number of days for missing school – each day a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes.

Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achievement in numeracy, writing and reading.

Getting in early

Attendance patterns are established early – a child regularly missing days in kindergarten or in the early years of school will often continue to miss classes in the later years, and receive lower test scores than their classmates. It's vital that students go to school every day – even in the early years of primary school.

What we can do

The main reasons for absence are:

Sickness – There are always times when students need to miss school, such as when they're ill. It's vital that they're only away on the days they are genuinely sick, and setting good sleep patterns, eating well and exercising regularly can make a big difference.

It's vital that holidays are planned during school holidays where possible, and not during the term if it can be avoided.

"Day off" – Think twice before letting your child have a "day off" as they could fall behind their classmates – every day counts.

Truancy – This is when students choose not to go to school without their parent's permission. There can be many reasons for truancy. The best way to address this is for schools and parents to work together.

If for any reason your child must miss school, there are things you can do with your school to ensure they don't fall behind:

 Speak with your classroom teacher and find out what work your child needs to do to keep up. Develop an absence learning plan with your teacher and ensure your child completes the plan.

Remember, every day counts. If your child must miss school, speak with your classroom teacher as early as possible.

Openly communicating with your child's school about all absences is a good way to prevent attendance issues being escalated to a School Attendance Officer. A School Attendance Officer is a Department of Education and Early Childhood Development Regional Director who has authority to follow up attendance issues. Attendance issues that are escalated can lead to an Infringement Notice.

If you're having attendance issues with your child, please let your classroom teacher know so we can work together to get your child to school every day.
