## **Principal's Report**

#### Step-Up Morning

We will have a "step-up" morning on Tuesday 9 December from 9:50 till 11:00am. Children new to the school will be invited to join our current population as they move into their new grade groups and meet teachers. This day is the transition day for our Grade 6 students as they visit their new schools so is an ideal time for this activity.

#### **Congratulations Junko**

I am pleased to announce that Junko Nicholls will be teaching Japanese at Foundation level next year. We are, of course, aiming to embed the language across the school. When our budget is confirmed in February, we will be looking at ways we can enhance learning in all areas including Japanese.

#### Cybersafety – be safe on line

Great to have a visit on "Cybersafety" for our senior students last week. This is an important aspect of modern life, especially with the potential to access and broadcast private details via unintentionally provided information. No matter how much we put the facts before children there can be no substitute for supervision and communication. A family policy about having/accessing technology in a public spot in the house is a subtle but effective way of ensuring that good manners are observed in communication and that checks and balances are in place. The most important thing children need is a reference point – someone to ask when they are unsure or are being challenged by something that they are viewing. Next year we are hosting sessions for families and parents.

#### Supervision of students after school

Teaching staff on yard duty after school have noticed several students waiting to be collected at the front gate on Rattray Road. Of greater concern is that some younger students are venturing outside the school gate unaccompanied. We ask that you remind your children to wait for you at the Castle steps so that they are visible to staff on duty after school. Teaching staff supervise students after school from 3:30-3:45 pm. Any children who have not been collected by 3:45 pm will be taken to the office where attempts will be made to contact caregivers.

## **Cyber Safety Incursion**

On Friday the 21<sup>st</sup> of November, Detective Senior Sergeant Rhonda Brown from the Melbourne Crime Investigation Unit came to our school with some others to talk about being safe online. Kids all over the world go online and this why they need to be on alert for scammers, liars and bullies.

We started off by talking about Facebook, Kick, Instagram and Snapchat, while on these websites you have to be careful of what you say and show. Rhonda told us why it's important not to show pictures of your street sign, house number or your school address online, as this private information of where you live. Other things she said were; Sites often update so it's important to keep checking your settings and make sure they're on private. This way only people you allow can go into your account. If you send things to your friends just remember once they have it they can send it to someone else!

While online a sign may appear on your screen often saying something like; You have just won \$2000, you've won an iPad or Won a car. All of these are scams to entice you so they can get their hands on your details, and then get your money. The police ended by handing us each a certificate and show bag full of safety material.

## **Cyber Safety – tips for parents**

Montmorency Primary School believes the teaching of cybersafe and responsible online behaviour is essential in the lives of students. On Friday 21<sup>st</sup> November we were visited by Detective Senior Sergeant Rhonda Brown from the Melbourne Crime Investigation Unit, to explicitly teach internet safety and responsible behaviour. Rhonda has a wealth of experience in this area and the students from Grades 3-6 listened to an informative presentation from her and her team.

Rhonda and the team will be coming back to Monty Primary in February next year to talk to our Parent Community about internet safety. We certainly will look forward to seeing her again.

#### An expert's tips for parents to stop cyber-bullying

Social media is more accessible than ever – with the rise of smartphones and tablets, it has never been easier to jump online. For young people, it means being more connected than any other generation – friends are never more than a tweet away.

Unfortunately this has also led to a rapid increase in cyberbullying – to the point that at least one in 10 children are cyberbullied each year. Cyberbullying can be very different from traditional bullying, and many parents can feel ill-equipped to respond if their child is being cyberbullied.

Susan McLean, a former police officer and Australia's leading cybersafety expert, said even if parents have no experience with social media, by following a few basic steps, parents can effectively support their children to be safe online.

'Parenting in the 21st century requires you to be able to parent in the digital space,' Ms McLean said. 'Technology is firmly entrenched in our lives and that of our children so we need the tools to deal with issues as they arise.'

'It's really important that if your child is being cyberbullied, you don't cut them off from social media and take their technology away - the vast majority of kids won't tell a parent if they are bullied and harassed online for fear of losing access. They would much rather put up with the bad to keep the good.'

Ms McLean said when confronted with their child being cyberbullied, parents should follow the cyberbullying quick response checklist:

- Reassure and comfort
- Don't respond
- Block and delete bully
- Report to the site
- Keep a copy
- Tell school (or relevant place) and seek action
- If ongoing inform Police
- Support your child as they have done nothing wrong

As a "made-up" language, gibberish allows children the freedom to be creative and expressive without the fear of saying the wrong thing.

developed throughout the school year. Children who don't read over the break can lose core reading skills and slide backwards, potentially falling behind when they return to school.


Teachers report that it can take up to six weeks into the new school year for students to regain lost reading skills. Reading for fun over the holidays helps your child stay ahead!
